Mrs Power has a real love for history and has found it hard to find the perfect book to recommend. In fact, she will happily to talk to anyone about history and what to read, should you ask ker.


Book Review: A Street Through Time by DK and Steve Noon

Children enjoy spotting the little changes, from houses and clothes to tools and inventions, and it's a great way to get them thinking about how the past connects to the world around them.


Children like to explore each page, ask questions, and imagine what life was like for the people who lived there.




Children's Laureate Joseph Coelho
